MAJOR CONSTRUCTION PROJECT—NEW BRIDGE IN THE PROVINCE

oads infrastructure development in Limpopo province remains a major priority as Limpopo Department of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure together with Roads Agency Limpopo continue to work together to address roads infrastructure issues in the Province. On 21st February 2023, the provincial government held an official handover and SOD turning ceremony for the construction of the bridge of an estimated cost of R127 million and rehabilitation of road D2219 at Ga-Malekana. The memorandum of agreement signed by Roads Agency Limpopo and eight mining companies operating in the Sekhukhune District will benefit local community members and Small, Mediumsized and Micro Enterprises.

On behalf of Premier Stanley Mathabatha, MEC Nkakareng Rakgoale officiated the launch of the construction of bridge project. MEC acknowledged the good cooperation between the government and private sector in working towards improving service delivery and development of roads infrastructure. She also highlighted that the

national government's declaration of flood related to national disaster will enable speed intervention to repair the 11 damaged bridges and 202 roads in Vhembe and Mopani districts as well as identified critical roads that need to be repaired.


In addition, MEC announced that RAL has appointed 41 consultant engineers and 100 contractors for upgrading, rehabilitation and designs of roads in the province.

Jacob Tolo from Kutollo Villager, expressed

that the Steel bridge project will have a great impact in the community with job opportunities to unemployed youth, and that they are grateful as community since there has been uncontrolled traffic during month end. He said they have been waiting for long."

ublic Service Commission (PSC) partnered with the Limpopo Provincial Government to host the Citizens' Forum at Mapela Stadium in Mogalakwena Local Municipality, Mokopane.

The community of Mapela had all the questions that they had for the government answered when a Chapter 9 Institution, the Public Service Commission visited them led by it's commissioners on the 03 March 2023. Chairperson of the commission Prof Somadoda Fikeni urged all the respondents from various government departments to be honest to the community when replying to the questions so that they can develop trust in the government system.

"Section 195 of chapter 10 of the Constitution

says community must be consulted and there must be transparency". He further highlighted that it is not ok for community to ask for a clinic only to be given a soccer field, they must be the first ones to know what they have asked and what is about to be delivered.

Representatives from the Anglo American mine which is also mining in the area

were present led by Ms Mosiane, the Processor. She spoke about the social development projects which the mine is doing in the area and also the employment opportunity they have provided for the community.

The provincial government led by Premier, Mr Stanley Mathabatha, pleaded with government employees to avoid turning back community members when they come to their offices in need of services even if the issues

Forum under Bakenberg Traditional Council Office met with MEC Nkakareng Executive Rakgoale, Waterberg Mayor Cllr Morris Mataboge and Mogalakwena Mayor Cllr Ngoako Tauatsoala to discuss the long awaited multiyear and phased construction of Road D3556. Only 7km was constructed on the 38.8km stretch of road that connects over 12 villages under Kgoshigadi Lekalakala and Kgosi Langa's leadership.

A SOD turning ceremony for the MEC Rakgoale flanked by Cllr Mataboge and Cllr Tauatsoalo construction of the road was done back in 2017 held at Tiberius Sporting Ground, thereafter the project halted. The funds reserved for construction surrendered, "but how when we still awaiting for the road" asked Mr Lekalakala the



Secretary for the Tiberius Development Forum.

MEC Rakgoale said "political change in the department and municipalities should not affect or deviate commitments made with

communities, officials should ensure that those commitments are implemented through proper handover to newly appointed political heads."

The department is awaiting approval of funds from the Presidential Infrastructure Grant to assist in construction of Road D3556 along with other provincial roads in the infrastructure plans. MEC Rakgoale requested the district office to regravel the road while awaiting construction and doing maintenance avoid occasionally. "We are engaging municipalities with machinery to

maintain the road and the department providing fuel, while still awaiting procurement of new yellow fleet machinery at districts," said the MEC.

oad D3248 in Greater Tzaneen Municipality, Mopani District will now recieve an upgrade from gravel to tar as the contractor has been formally introduced by the MEC of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure on the 14th March 2023 to the community and other stakeholders.

This is the road which connects the Deerpark

Cross to Mandhlakazi, Nwamitwa and other villages in that area. MEC Rakgoale said this is part of the efforts by the department and Roads Agency Limpopo to ensure that there is improved roads infrastructure in the province.

Chief Executive Officer of RAL Mr Gabriel Maluleke outlined that the project scope of work it is estimated to take up to 12 months to complete and they have budgeted R90 million for it, which 30 percent of it is reserved for

local SMMEs and 10 percent for the local labourers.

Hosi Nwamitwa II of the Valoyi Traditional Council said that they are very overwhelmed to have been remembered by the Provincial Government in terms of roads infrastructure services and assured the MEC that all the process will go well.

he EPWP In-house Programme is run internally by the department. The beneficiaries are recruited internally and assist with the maintenance activities that are conducted by our road maintenance teams at the Cost Centres. The activities include amongst others, pothole repairs, pothole patching, bush clearing, cleaning of pipes and side drains, stone pitching, installation of pipes and erection of roads signs.

Household Contractor is appointed by the department on a 36 months (3 year) contract for the maintenance of provincial road infrastructure. A target for the number of the EPWP beneficiaries that needs to be recruited over the term is included in the bid document and the beneficiaries are therefore recruited externally by the contractor. The contractor provides additional maintenance support to the the In-house Teams.

This assists the department to provide far reaching services to the communities at large. Capricorn District is currently working on road D1589 (Ga-Makgato road), D1468 (Vivo to Indermark), P94/2 (Vivo to Alldays), D1200 (Senwabarwana), P54/1(Munnik), D1356 (Ramokgopa), D3600 (Moletane-Mehlareng) and D4064 (Lebowakgomo to Mamaolo).





The purpose was also to share important information relating to Men and Women's reproductive health, and also focus on financial challenges that go hand in hand with this Month of Love. "The focus was also to appreciate and celebrate with colleagues who may not be able to celebrate Valentine's day as individuals, but also benefit from celebrating with colleagues," explained Ms. Maggie Mothiba, from Employee Health and Wellness.

"This is important for officials' mental health and for optimal service delivery," emphasized Ms. Jennifer Mudau from Employee Health and Wellness in Head Office.

She further elaborated on the need to seek help when things are not going well, when responding to Post Traumatic Stressors, need to ventilate i.e. cry, rest, and get a trusted confidante or professional help that

the Department offers voluntarily and freely.

Men were especially discouraged from bottling things up and seek help when facing problems. She reiterated that "No one is immune to problems and mental health is something to be taken lightly as neglect affects the body immensely and this may lead to losina workforce".

Employees were given a presentation on the importance of structuring finances to avoid paying for similar insurances yet not having cash flow for basic necessities even getting into debt just to survive. Emphasis was also made on having a legal will, so that the estate that has been accumulated through hard work is given to the rightful beneficiaries after passing on.

This service on wills has been linked with Department of Home Affairs so when client has passed, beneficiaries are assisted to claim as soon as possible.

Presentation on usage of female and male condoms was made and the importance of always being safe from sexually transmitted diseases especially the Month of Love. "The of usage Mpesu, that are any herb that enhances optimal the functioning of

the male reproductive system should be supported and not be shunned upon," advised Dr Sheila Mogaila, a General Practitioner.

Dr Mogaila gave a presentation on a GentiShe, the menstrual cup, that is affordable. odourless. practical, environmentally friendly and easy to use, developed especially for African women. It is a one-time cost alternative that will last for up to 2 years and is available nationally. It was designed considering how expensive sanitary pads and tampons are, as on average women could spend about R3600 a year to purchase them. The dignity of less fortunate women is therefore compromised every month during "that time of the month" as they may not even afford the pads to start with. The GentiShe menstrual cup is made to be emptied only four times a day and easy to clean by only rinsing clean water. It was an eventful day that all officials greatly benefited from, and Valentines' sweets were shared and photo shoots to round up the Month of Love celebrations before on-site Tests and consultations with Old Mutual,

She then approached the supervisor then Mr Masutha and initiated to get 3-4 months training at Capricorn District to learn more about service

termination processes, procedures and forms.

During her service at the department, she prides herself in being a member of Human Resource team that won both the departmental and provincial service excellence awards in 2018/2019 for being able to issue service

payout a month after terminations. This she said was achieved by processing paperwork of employees due for retirement 5-6 months before they out of service.

One of her greatest achievement being tracking down the family of the late HOD Seoketsa Mathole who passed away with his family and other immediate family members in a car accident. She used her own resources, time and energy which succeeded after 5 years of relentless search, which resulted in finding a sister and elderly mother in North West Province to receive the GEPF pay outs.

She advised staff members that "on daily activities being executed, take it serious. Don't leave things unresolved and make follow ups with stakeholders and please don't turn clients away."






The shield shows both identity and spiritual defence. The two figures symbolise unity.
