"Roads infrastructure is a key enabler for economic development and job creation. The recent floods that have devasted our province have caused a major setback on progress that we were making towards roads infrastructure development, be it #DikgerekgereWednesdays wherein we were prioritising internal capacity for maintenance of our 13 500 km of unpaved roads, or our #ThibaMekoti campaign that focussed on patching potholes on the 6500 km of tarred roads. We are, however, a resilient people that would not be deterred by such circumstances. We shall repair these roads, we are going to fix these bridges. In partnership with different stakeholders, including the SANDF, mining houses operating in our province and SANRAL we shall bridge over these troubled waters. We have therefore directed the MEC for Limpopo Department of Public Works Roads and Infrastructure to work with members of the Infrastructure Cluster to prioritise and classify various roads in our province, be it local, provincial or national roads" said Premier Dr. Phophi Ramathuba

VAT Zero-Rating introduced on specific edible offal, specific meat cuts, unflavoured dairy liquid blends and specific canned vegetables to assist poor households.



Tobacco

Increase of 6.75% in excise duties on cigars and pipe tobacco and 4.75% on cigarettes and other tobacco products.



Transfer Duty

Transfer duty is adjusted for the effect of inflation.

impopo Department of Public Works, Roads, and Infrastructure continues to actively engage with communities through the #StakeholderTuesday initiative. The program focuses on maintaining and improving provincial gravel roads, ensuring they are accessible and safe for residents and tourists alike.

stakeholder engagement initiatives highlight the department's commitment to working closely with local , magoshi, taxi association, development forums and communities to enhance infrastructure and service delivery across the province.

This is the brainchild of MEC Rachoene to enhance transparency and accountability of the department as the custodians of government infrastructure.

The MEC together with Road Agency Limpopo (RAL) executives, the Accounting Authority Mr. Moses Tseli, Chief Executive Officer Mr.Makhitha Chesane, Head of Department Mr Motlhanke Phukuntsi and Road Infrastructure Chief Director Ms Ledile Mashilwane joins the MEC in this initiative to provide prompt

responses in terms of progress and



timeframes. expected The communities that were engaged recently are from Ephraim Mogale. Sekhukhune District about roads D4340, D4325, D4326, D4328, D4300 and D4306; Mogalakwena Local Municipality about Road D1958; Greater Letaba Municipality about Road D3200; Fetakgomo-Tubatse about Road D2405: Thulamela Local Municipality about roads D5017 and D3684; Makofane Traditional about road D4140, D4179 and D4144; Lekgwareng Community about roads D3203, D3220 and D3221 & Wall 11 Development Committee about Road D3731.

Concurrently #StakeholderTuesday #ThibaMekoti—an initiative launched by the department to tackle the province's pothole problem. Since its launch in 2022, the program repaired and maintained damaged roads, to make roads accessible.

The persistent rainfall since the beginning of 2025 has made a significant damage in the province, with Waterberg, Mopani and Vhembe districts being the mostly affected by the floods. In the process undoing much of the progress done through these two initiatives.

The floods eroded the roads and caused many bridges to collapse, this left most areas inaccessible, leaving residents and motorist stranded. The Limpopo Executive Council led by Premier Dr. Phophi Ramathuba declared a state of disaster in the province. The department is hard at work trying to manage the effect and the aftermath of the disaster caused by the heavy rains and floods.

The Department of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure's Roads Maintenance team at district and cost centre level are working diligently to repair the damaged infrastructure to reconnect the communities. The teams are busy regravelling, unblocking culverts and blading the roads to redirect the storm water and reduce the impact of floods on land.

machinery Various has been deployed to affected areas to assist to restore access. However the #ThibaMekoti, #StakeholderTuesday and #DikgerekgereWednesday has made a big difference in fixing Limpopo's roads, however challenges like floods have slowed down the progress.

√he project officially began on June 4, 2023, following the SOD-turning ceremony of the steel bridge over the Steelpoort River at Ga-Malekane on February 21, 2023. The Road Agency Limpopo and the mining companies are jointly constructing the new steel bridge on the D2219 linking R555 T-Junction and rehabilitating the old single-lane one. The new bridge will substitute the old steel bridge, a local heritage site, which will be refurbished and repurposed exclusively for pedestrian use, this project is set to be completed in 2027 This bridge is a transformation of the single-lane bridge into a double-lane, with the aim to reduce traffic congestion.

The residents of Sekhukhune District, particularly those travelling between Burgersfort, Steelpoort, Grobersdal, Malekana, Jane Furse and surrounding areas under the Fetakgomo-Tubatse Local Municipality will soon experience better and improved travel conditions The event was attended representatives Mayor of the Fetakgomo-Tubatse Municipality, Maboa Maleka; Sekhukhune District Executive Mayor's representative, Mafefe; Kgosi Malekane and his RAL Traditional Council; Interim Accounting Authority Moses Tseli; Head of Department Motlhanke Phukuntsi;

other government officials and community members.
The MEC for Public Works, Roads, and

Infrastructure, Mr.Ernest Rachoene, conducted a walkabout at the construction site to assess progress. The MEC also acknowledged its deteriorated state following heavy rainfall in the province. He assured residents that the road would be prioritised in the upcoming financial year and rehabilitated in phases once the budget is approved. The MEC also appealed to communities to refrain from damaging roads during protests.

EC for Public Works, Roads & Infrastructure, Mr.Ernest Rachoene, recently visited Limpopo Législature the Government Complex to assess the progress of the ongoing service delivery monitoring programme. The initiative, launched in preparation for the State of Province Address (SOPA), designed to enhance both security and maintenance at this key national site, ensuring that it remains a safe and dignified space for legislative operations. MEC Rachoene was accompanied by South African Police Service (SAPS) head Brigadier Malele and Sekhukhune District Director Ms. Dorcas Manyelo. Their visit formed part of a broader effort to uphold the structural integrity and security standards of government facilities, which are crucial

During the visit, MEC Rachoene engaged with officials responsible for delivery, service stressing maintaining importance of hiah standards in government facilities. He highlighted that a clean, well-maintained environment not only ensures the safety of those working in and visiting the legislature but also fosters a sense of professionalism and accountability within government institutions.

Brigadier Malele echoed these sentiments, emphasizing the strong link between security and cleanliness, particularly in high-profile government "A well-maintained buildings. environment plays a crucial role in effective security management. When a space is kept clean and orderly, it minimizes potential risks and enhances operational efficiency. Collaboration between different stakeholders is key to ensuring the sustainability of these efforts," he stated.

As part of the initiative, several key maintenance and restoration tasks were undertaken. monumental The tombstone of former Lebowa Chief Minister Dr. C.N. Phatudi, a historical landmark within the precinct, was repainted and restored to its proper condition. Additionally, extensive bush clearing was carried out in surrounding areas to improve visibility and security. Facility maintenance also conducted structural assessments to identify areas needing further rehabilitation.

This initiative is part of a broader

government effort to improve service delivery across public facilities, ensuring that key infrastructure remains in optimal condition. The Department of Public Works, Roads & Infrastructure has committed to ongoing monitoring and maintenance efforts to sustain these improvements over time.

Looking ahead, the programme will continue with regular inspections and collaboration between government departments and security agencies to maintain the integrity of the legislature precinct. By prioritizing both safety and service delivery, the initiative sets a precedent for the long-term preservation of public assets in Limpopo.

fter 43 years of dedication, a trailblazing leader reflects on her Journey.

Ms Manyeľo Manoko Dorcas, a renowned administrator and leader, dedicated her life to serve in the public service for 43 years. With a career spanning over four decades, she has left an indelible mark on the public As she celebrates her sector. retirement as Director of Sekhukhune District at the age of 65, we took a moment to reflect on her remarkable journey in the Limpopo Department of Public Works, Roads & Infrastructure (LDPWRI).

Born and raised in the Limpopo Province, a small village of Ga Hlahla, Manyelo's passion administration was ignited at the young age of 22. She began her career in the public service in the same department, dominated by males, in the then Lebowa Government as a Typist in 1981 and quickly rose through the ranks, she got promoted to a post of Administrative Clerk Auxiliary Services in 1982, Senior Administrative Clerk in 1987 and Chief Administrative Clerk in 1990. Throughout the 1990s and 2000s, Ms Manyelo continued to take on increasingly senior roles, including Administrative Officer for Auxiliary Services in 1993, Administrative Officer for Property and Facilities in 1997, Property and Facilities 1999. Acting Manager of Property and Facility in Capricorn District in 2000.

Manyelo's leadership expertise was further recognised with appointments as Shared Services Manager Sekhukhune District in Senior Supply 2001, Acting of Manager Chain in Head Office Polokwane in 2006 and Shared Services Center Manager Coordination Sekhukhune District in 2007. Ms Manyelo served as District Senior Manager of Sekhukhune District from 2011 to 2013, culminating in her appointment Director of Sekhukhune District in 2015, the first Director and the first woman Director of the

District. In her Directorship, Ms Manyelo oversaw the maintenance of roads and buildings, and ensured that the infrastructure was safe, reliable and maintained. Her financial management expertise ensued that

resources were allocated efficiently and that the district operated within budget enabling the department to deliver on its mandate and gave effective services to the public. Her expertise in auxiliary property management, financial management and the entire organizational management was sought after by this departments.

Throughout her career, Ms Manyelo was recognized for her outstanding contributions in the entire department. Under her leadership the district received gold numerous awards Departmental Excellence Awards in all categories, which are, best service delivery team, best innovative team, best performing district and teams for individuals, and

the Premier Service Excellence Awards.

As Director, she was instrumental in shaping the administrative policies and procedures of the department. Her leadership and expertise ensured the smooth operation of administrative systems.

As she reflected on her remarkable career, Ms Manyelo shared on the lessons learned and the challenges she overcame. "My journey has not been without obstacles, however, I have always been driven by my passion for administration and my commitment to serving community." She said.
In retirement, Ms Manyelo planned to

continue making a difference in her community and to the ends of the world. She aimed to share her knowledge and expertise with public servants, mentoring them to become

LIMPOPO PROVINCE MARKS WORLD TB DAY WITH RENEWED COMMITMENT

he Limpopo Province commemorates World TB Day on the 20th of March 2025, at the Peter Nchabeleng Sport Centre Schonoord Village, Makhuduthamaga Local Municipality, Sekhukhune District. This year's theme, "Yes, You and I Can End TB! Commit, Invest, Deliver" emphasizes the importance of collective action in combating Tuberculosis.

In attendance were the Limpopo Provincial Departments, led by Dieketseng Mashego representing the Premier, Executive Mayor of Sekhukhune District Councillor Mina Bahula, Makhuduthamaga Mayor of Local Municipality Councillor Merah Mahlase, Magoshi, community members and other stakeholders.

progress Despite in treatment and prevention, the disease remains a significant health threat. In the 2023/2024 financial year, the Limpopo Province recorded 13 000 TB patients, with the majority successfully completing treatment. However, over 1 600 lost while lives were treatment.

The Acting Premier emphasised that TB is curable, stating, 'The first step is to get screened and lf diagnosed, start treatment immediately and remain on it until fully cured.' She also highlighted the National Department of Health's Targeted Universal Testing for TB Strategy, which ensures routine testing for high-risk individuals, including those with HIV, pregnant women and those close contact with TB patients. Furthermore, stressed the need to eliminate stigmatization associated with TB, saying, "Stigmatization only pushes people away from seeking help, increasing the risk

of transmission within our families, workplaces and communities."

To reduce TB transmission, the Acting Premier shared simple preventative measures, including proper ventilation, respiratory hygiene and good hygiene practices. conclusion, Acting the In Premier called on everyone to commit to ending TB, saying, "Let us commit, invest and deliver on this promise. Let us take action today. Let us breathe easy, knowing that TB is curable and that together we can make a difference."

LIMPOPO COMMEMORATES YESTERDAY'S SACRIFICE AND TODAY'S FREEDOM

he Premier of Limpopo Dr. Phophi Ramathuba led a delegation of provincial dignitaries to commemorate and honour the 69 victims of the 1960 Sharpville Massacre. This year's commemoration was celebrated under the theme Deepening a Culture of Social Justice and Human Rights. "This theme challenges us to reflect on the progress we have made in building a just and equal society while acknowledging the work that still lies ahead," said Premier Dr. Ramathuba.

Nationally this is a day which honours the memory of the struggle heroes and heroines who fought for the democracy and human rights for all South

Africans to enjoy.

Premier Ramathuba used the platform to raise awareness of social ills in families that leads and encourages genocide and women abuse in marriages. "Despite our democratic gains, violence against women and girls remains a national crisis, placing South Africa among the countries with the highest rates of femicide. Gender-based violence is an urgent human rights issue that impacts the lives of women and girls across all communities. It undermines their social, economic, and political participation and must be eradicated" advised Premier Ramathuba.


t the start of 2025, Limpopo's roads were busy with holiday travelers returning home. Frequent road accidents prompted the provincial government to step up its efforts to enhance road safety during festive season. The Executive Council, Department of Transport at the provincial and national level took action by intensifying the Arrive Alive campaign. MEC Ernest Rachoene was deployed at Seshego to assist in curbing road traffic violations.

The campaign wasn't just about setting up roadblocks-it's main focus was about saving lives by promoting safe driving practices. Law enforcement officers and government officials worked together at site around the province, focusing on accident-prone routes like the N1, R71 and R37. The officers stopped vehicles to check for roadworthiness, valid licenses, and compliance with safety laws. Many unroadworthy cars were pulled off the road to prevent potential accidents.

The MEC used the opportunity to hand out safety pamphlets and spoke to drivers about the dangers of reckless behavior, fatigue, and not wearing seatbelts.

Arrive Alive deployment in province showed that with the right interventions, road safety can be improved. While progress was made, more work is needed to ensure that safer driving habits and compliance are followed so it become the norm.


