- ⇒ Ficus Microcorpa planted by Facilities staff

BUILT ENVIRONMENT CLIMATE CHANGE INDABA 2025: DRIVING RESILIENCE AND

he Built Environment Climate Change Indaba (BECCI 2025), organised and led by the Council for the Environment (CBE) in partnership with the Vhembe District Municipality, was held on the 11-12 September 2025 in Limpopo. The CBE is an entity of the National Department of Public Works and Infrastructure. This strategic annual gathering seeks to interrogate the intersection of climate change and the built environment while mobilising the sector towards resilience, adaptation, and sustainability.

The Indaba serves as a high-level platform bringing together policymakers, professionals, academics, researchers, and civil society to engage in dialogue and co-create actionable solutions. These outcomes are aligned with the National Development Plan (NDP 2030), South Africa's commitments to the G20, and broader global climate imperatives.

Opening discussions, led by Ms. Koketso Maimela, Manager: Strategic Support & Projects at the CBE, explored ways to translate national policy frameworks into municipal action. The dialogue emphasised the need to harmonise land governance with development and climate priorities while ensuring accountability in infrastructure delivery.

Dr. Gift Mphefu, Managing Director of

Office of Med-Tech Engineering, showcased the role of engineering innovation in strengthening community livelihoods through smart power solutions and resilient settlements.

Dr. Khangwelo Musetsho, Council Member at the CBE, highlighted the urgency of rethinking land-use governance for climate resilience, stressing that today's planning decisions will shape tomorrow's sustainability.

One of the panel discussion under the theme "Resilient Economies & Nature-Solutions" brought together Based industry experts who demonstrated how infrastructure can drive local economic growth. The session showcased agro-processing, opportunities in tourism, and small enterprises, while also ensuring that development strengthens connectivity and community livelihoods.

Adding momentum, Limpopo MEC for the Department of Works, **Public** Roads and Infrastructure. Mr. Ernest Rachoene, underscored the urgency of delivering climateresilient infrastructure during his keynote address. He

stressed that every project must not only address immediate community needs but also foster long-term resilience against the impacts of climate change.

The MEC further called for stronger collaboration across government, traditional leaders, professional councils, the private sector, and local communities to collectively tackle climate challenges.

The Built Environment Climate Change Indaba 2025 reinforces the pivotal role of the built environment in addressing climate change. By fostering collaboration, innovation, and sustainable planning, the Indaba positions the sector as a key driver of resilience and inclusive growth for present and future generations.

Department he Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure with the assistance of the Limpopo division of the South African **Police** Service's Directorate for Priority Crime (DPCI), Investigation Anti-Corruption Unit and Asset Forfeiture Unit (AFU) of the National Prosecuting Authority (NPA) secured a preservation order from Polokwane High Court on four government properties in Giyani valued at R18.2 million. The properties are Erf 2B, Erf 58B, Erf 64B

and Erf 227B in Kremertart Street in Giyani, Mopani District.

Unlawful occupation of any government owned property and land remains a thorny issue as it compromise and undermines the economic

stability and social order of any provincial and national department. In response, the LDWPRI

initiated the Vhuyisa Thundu ya Muvhuso (loosely translated as bring government property) operation in order emphasise lawful reclamation, balanced justice and sustainable management of its immovable assetsone property at a time, one municipality at a time.

This is a start in the new direction that shows the department's fight to reclaim its assets from unlawful occupants to safeguard the integrity of public resources moreover immovable assets. "The battle is won, but the war continues to safeguard government properties and ensure rule of law prevails," said MEC Ernest Rachoene.




