DIKGEREKGERE CHANGING ROAD NETWORKS IN THE PROVINCE

ith over 13 000km of gravel roads in the province, the launch of the massive road infrastructure maintenance Premier, campaign, by Dr. Ramathuba, is a positive response to the needs of people of Limpopo. "Dikgerekgere Wednesday" The campaign, a programme driven by the MEC for Public Works, Roads

Infrastructure, and Ernest Rachoene, was officially launched on D3842 road in Village, Mongalo Lephalale local municipality, the in Waterberg District. Subsequent to that district launches were held. In Vhembe the launch was on road D 3647 Madonsi in Village, Mopani district on road D3842 in Maphatha Village,

District Capricorn D3459 in Mokgehle village and road D4225 Manganeng Village in the Sekhukhune district. This was part of expanding the programme to other gravel roads also in dire need of maintenance.

The significance of the initiative is to improve the roads infrastructure of the Limpopo Province by gradually blading, regraveling, and debushing gravel roads, especially in areas that have not received tar roads. Not only does this initiative boost the economic development of the

Across the districts, Premier Ramathuba further emphasised the need for jobs to be created through the appointment of more officials within the road's infrastructure component in order for work to be done with speed.

The department is using internal capacity, as in officials from the roads infrastructure component from districts and the 36 cost centres including participants of the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP). These men and women use machinery owned by the department from graders to soft rollers, water tankers and other earthmoving equipment.



ational Routes (N) part of the national highway section called freeways. These routes serve long-distance travel, interconnecting major cities, ports and borders. The N-routes are designed to support high volume of traffic and include key freeways such as N1, N2, N3, N4 etc. which connect South Africa's economic hubs i.e. Johannesburg, Cape Town, Durban. In actual fact the N routes are the backbone of South African road networks managed by the South African National Roads Agency Limited (SANRAL). SANRAL's primary responsibility is to ensure that these roads are well-maintained, safe and meet the needs of the national and international trades.

egional routes (R) are roads that connect cities, towns and rural areas to the main national highway networks e.g. R101 is a regional road running parallel to the N1 in some areas. These roads are typically less significant than N Roads as they serve local traffic yet play a crucial role in connecting towns and facilitating intra-regional transport. However the R Roads are critical for the regional economic development as they facilitate local commerce and transport – especially in more remote areas. These roads support tourism by connecting travellers to attractions that are off the main highway.

istrict/provincial routes (D) refers to the secondary roads that link smaller towns or areas to the national road networks. They are maintained by the provincial government and district municipalities.



he National Council of provinces (NCOP) visited Limpopo province as part of their oversight visit, which forms part of its flagship National Provincial week Programme.

The delegation which was led by member of Parliament Mr. Frans Mokwele, who is the NCOP Limpopo provincial whip, visited several infrastructure projects in the Waterberg district to check progress being made. One of the projects visited was the road infrastructure project of Segole 1 Segole 2 road D3561 and N11 connecting to the in Mogalakwena local municipality. The project is in its first phase of implementation which is upgrading from gravel to tar, planned to cover a distance of 7 km. This is one of the provinces roads strategic being implemented by Roads Agency Limpopo (RAL), an entity of the department of public Works, Roads and Infrastructure.

The oversight visit provided an opportunity for the department to also present to the delegates the challenges confronting the province in relation to the needs

of the people regarding the upgrade and maintenance of the road network versus the financial resources available which are inadequate. Rather than sitting back and doing nothing, MEC for the Department, Mr. Ernest Rachoene also highlighted the programme, the province has embarked on to ensure that roads are drivable and safe. Dikgerekgere Wednesday is one initiative that through its implementation, grave roads are being maintained through regravelling, blading as well as "We grass cutting. have embarked on a massive roads infrastructure maintenance programme and our people have communicated to us that they welcome the initiative as it making their lives easier, through this programme we also want to

ensure we create jobs." Concluded Rachoene as he briefed the delegates.

The delegates welcomed the brief and encouraged the department to continue implementing programmes that have direct impact on people's lives and to ensure that the road visited is completed and is of quality and any challenges should be communicated. This was in line with the theme of the oversight visit. which was "Confronting the challenges facing the timely delivery of viable public infrastructure to communities."

Construction on Road D3561 commenced in May 2023 and phase 1 is expected to be completed in the next financial year.

t is important to communicate effectively when providing services in government, to avoid misinformation and disinformation, especially when communicating with People with Disabilities. The Limpopo Department of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure saw the need to train the Front Line Team comprised of officials from Head Office and Districts from 16-20 September 2024, in Polokwane. The training ensured that the officials that interact more with various internal and external clients know and understand basic South African sign language.

Sign language is the way many people who are deaf or hard of hearing use to communicate. The LDPWRI Team was trained by Ms. Kim Fisher, Sign Language Teacher from DeafSA. Kim, who is Deaf, ensured that there were no shortcuts to the training and no dull moment for the whole week. Officials were expected to understand the Rules and vocabulary of the South African Sign Language (SASL), Deaf culture and Deaf Community. The following were the Specific Outcomes of the Training:

- Introduce themselves and others using South African Sign Language
- Provide Information about themselves using SASL.
- Use grammatical features consistent with the requirements of the communicative task and rules of SASL.
- Hold a conversation with a group of Signers using SASL.

Ms. Fisher gave the Team formative assessment activities that taught Learners to fingerspell, use facial expressions to additional convey information to а conversation, lip read, use hand movements to communicate signs for effective communication,

and hold a basic sign language conversation. Some of the things the Team learnt to sign were; greeting, fingerspelling names, name signs, signing job titles, provinces, cities, food, colours and sport preferences, family structure, and saying goodbye in an inclusive way.

One example is that a person is represented by an upright forefinger and by turning it and moving it about you can show the person facing you, facing away from you, approaching you, walking away, sideways, and so on. As part of Summative Assessment by Assessor, Aisha, the Team was expected to: -

- Be able to interpret a Sign Language Video
- Submit a written Portfolio of Evidence about what was learnt
- Have a minimum of five (5) minutes sign language conversation with a Colleague

It was a very interesting course that will indeed improve effective communication using Sign Language in the department, promote inclusivity, and harness the culture of team work as the team will remind one another of what they have learnt and share the basic sign language

knowledge with other colleagues, for improved service delivery.



The construction of the Botshabelo community library in Lephalale which encountered challenges during its implementation is back on track, thanks to the intervention by MEC Ernest Rachoene, who boldly confronted issues of constant disruptions and harassment of contractor allegedly by some SMME's in the community who wanted to benefit from the project.

The R15-million project commenced in 2022 and was expected to be completed within 12 months, due to delays caused by these challenges, some construction work continues on site. Due to its price tag, which is under R30-million, the project does not fall within the category of projects which has a mandatory of 30% that should go to SMME's, however, the contractor decided to empower some local upcoming enterprises within the community, who where contracted for plant hire, electrical works, plumbing, G5 material, local labour sand and water supplier amounting to about R3.7 million. With that, certain elements in the community felt they needed more even the whole project ceded to them for implementation and caused

disruptions.

The MEC intervened accompanied by the Executive mayor of Waterberg District, Cllr Jack Maeko and Mayor of Lephalale, Cllr Aaron Mokgetle including Kgosi Seleka to ensure that construction 'mafia style' tendencies are uprooted.

Elevating the fight against gender-based violence in his 2024 State of the Nation Address to Parliament, President Cyril Ramaphosa expressed his support for a National Pledge against genderbased violence and femicide in which all men would personally commit themselves to ending violence against women.

A PLEDGE FOR SOUTH AFRICAN MEN TO END GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

AS A MAN, I COMMIT ALWAYS TO:

- Treat all women as equals.
- Treat a woman as a person, not as an object or possession.
- Support women as best as I can and actively play my part to challenge rape culture and stop any forms of prejudice, abuse or violence against women.
- Call out other men for their inappropriate behaviour or inappropriate comments towards women.
- Respect a woman as I would expect to be respected as a man because respect, equality, and the human rights of all South Africans are non-negotiable.
- Be a role model in teaching boys in my family and my community that expressing their emotions is not a sign of weakness, that violence is not a way to resolve conflict and that women must be treated with respect.
- Treat other women how I would like my mother, sister, or daughter to be treated.
- Advocate for the safety and well-being of children and actively work against all forms of abuse and violence.
- Call out and correct inappropriate behaviour towards children by adults and peers.

AS A MAN, I COMMIT NEVER TO:

- 1. Raise my hand against a woman.
- Intimidate, threaten, or demean any woman, whether it be physically, verbally, emotionally or sexually, or allow any other person to do so.
- Perpetuate stereotypes about women or assume anything about a woman from what she is wearing.
- Make a woman feel violated by my gaze, my words or my actions or make her uncomfortable due to my presence.
- Make physical and/or sexual contact with a woman without her explicit permission or force her into something she does not want to do.
- Condone or remain silent about gender-based violence.
- Walk away from my responsibilities as a father, if I have children.
- Use my position at home, in the workplace and in other social spaces to undermine women's human rights and dignity.
- Make a child feel unsafe or uncomfortable with my presence, words, or actions.
- Engage in any inappropriate contact with a child or disregard their boundaries.


